

HOSPITAL - V.C.

The hospital would be located in a combination of residential and business areas. The patients' rooms or wards would probably be located entirely in the residential area. There would be fewer patients' rooms needed in V.C. than in the obsolete cities of the same population. In V.C. a patient will be moved to his apt. at an earlier point in his recovery whenever the doctor feels he is ready, than would be possible outside of V.C. The patient's apt. becomes his hospital room. Being all in one bldg. it is possible for the doctor to continue checking the patient regularly but not as often as when he was in the hospital section.

Fewer patients' beds means less real estate and building construction tied up in the hospital section and altogether less cost to be paid in the form of hospital and medical insurance, the total cost of which is paid for by part of the total V.C. rent received.

This means lower rent which combined with the free hospital and medical benefits will add enormously to the strong competitive position of V.C.

The lobby and reception room of the hospital could be combined with the main V.C. lobby for additional savings and economy.

POSTAL SYSTEM - P.O. BOXES

The post office will be located in the Annex next to the cafeteria and kitchen. This section of the bldg. including the theater, grand ballroom and indoor tennis courts will have a height of 46'-50', whereas the rest of the Annex will probably be half as high. The serving ilsecoff the cafeteria will be in this lower section. The P.O. boxes will be across a hall from the eating area.

This location will enable everyone to conveniently check their P.O. box for mail at each mealtime or generally 3 times a day.

Every P.O. box should be designed with a slot in the cover so that people living in V.C. can drop letters, notes, cards etc. directly into another person's P.O. box of the same V.C. without being required to put a stamp on the envelope since it is obviously unnecessary for the P.O. to do the asserting and distributing when the people can do this for themselves easily and conveniently.

The P.O. should confine their activities mainly to incoming and outgoing mail between V.C. and other cities and other V.C.s.

When a package is too large to fit in a P.O. box, then a note could be placed in the box to pick the package up at the window. Packages would always require stamps unless the sender personally places the package inside a package delivery slot of the recipient's apt.
