

Individual piks would be sold in the entrance area. They would use it by attaching it to the hose in the water-pik booth, and then detaching for later use. In the meantime they keep the pik in their pocket.

The tables are cleared by the press of a button by an attendant providing The Southern Equipment Co. is able and willing to do the necessary engineering work to convert their pallet-veyor system to the VC cafeteria needs. If successful the table would be in sections each of which would move horizontally to the box like structure at the left in the picture and then move vertically to the kitchen below where the help would clear off the dirty dishes and automatic equipment would clean the table sections. While the cluttered soiled table sections are descending, clean ones will be ascending from the box on the right and immediately replace the soiled ones so that there is no delay in providing clean tables once the people there have finished.

In my picture the walls are decorated with dinosaurs in order that we will have a museum of natural history combined with the cafeteria and both for the price of one. The oriental rug designs are mosaics of ceramic tile.

Family Carts

One large area of the cafeteria will be used to feed families or groups of 3 or more people. Instead of using the Circl-Serv they would have a variety of family carts available to them. These would be about the size of a grocery basket and as easy to push. One cart would supply the meals for the whole family or group. The carts would vary in size starting with enough food for 3 people and range up to a capacity for at least 15 or more people. There would be a selection of 3 or 4 different menus for each size cart. These in all the varieties of menu for every size family would be fully loaded ready to be rolled over to the cashier by the head of the family or the leader of the group where one bill is paid for all. This will be especially convenient for families with small children.

The carts will be divided into 3 compartments for hot, cold and room temperature food. In the cart the food would be in covered serving bowls and there would be all the necessary tableware, napkins, cups and beverages, and glasses, dishes, etc. At the table the family would set their own table and serve their own food as if they were at home.
